## **Guidance for Parents**

This reading and writing activity should help your child practice their phonics. This activity is aimed at early readers and writers i.e. KS1 who are able to sound out and read simple texts and are confident forming letters. It is designed to practice reading and writing known phonemes/'encoding' to help learners with checking work.

The focus is on the 'ow' phoneme/sound as in 'throw' or 'own'. This is represented by the 'ow' grapheme/letters. This is taken from the national curriculum. If your child's school uses the 'Read Write Inc' phonic scheme, this phoneme is from Set 2 and is called 'ow, blow the snow'.

Children should read through the poem with your help, identifying each occasion where there is a gap. They should then read the words at the top of the page, sounding them out and choosing the best word from the options to complete the lines of the poem. If there are several potential correct words, they should choose which makes the most sense. The rhyme scheme may help. They can then practice writing the word.

The word down has been included as this contains a different phoneme 'ow' ('ow, brown cow'), but uses the same letters/grapheme as the target phoneme. This phoneme is from Set 3 on Read, Write Inc. When confronted with unfamiliar words or expressions, recognising the two potential sounds can help children practice decoding words that may look alike but sound very different. The primary purpose of this exercise is decoding of the 'ow' phoneme, but this can also be used to practise comprehension. Encourage them to try to infer meaning from the context of the sentence or story and then discuss if they worked it out correctly.
